Two Weber State Debate teams qualify for National Debate Tournament

Two Weber State Debate teams qualified for the 73rd National Debate Tournament March 22-26 at the University of Minnesota. The team of Bianca Morales and Hannah Phelps and the team of Zachery Thiede and Zachary Baker made the cut. Only 78 teams are invited. This is the first time for each of these students to qualify for the tournament. Morales is a senior majoring in Communication while Phelps is a freshman majoring in Communication. Zach Baker, a history major, and Zach Thiede, a double major in history and philosophy, have been with WSU Debate for two years.

Top Communication students invited to join national honor society

Junior and senior Communication majors with high GPAs will receive invitations this week to join Lambda Pi Eta, the national honor society for Communication students. To be eligible students must (1) complete 60 semester credit hours, (2) have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25 for all courses taken, (3) complete the equivalent of 12 semester credit hours in Communication, (4) have a minimum GPA of 3.25 for all Communication courses, (5) currently be enrolled as a student in good standing, as determined by the institution's policies, and (6) rank within the highest 35 percent of one's class in general scholarship. Invitations will be extended via postal mail and campus email. If you qualify, but do not receive your invitation by March 15, please contact Dr. Sheree Josephson at sjosephson@weber.edu to check your eligibility. Qualifying students will be honored at the department's end-of-year event. The deadline to join is March 22.

Organizational Communication Audits & Consulting offered in Fall

A Special Topics class (COMM 4500) called Organizational Communication Audits & Consulting will be offered Fall Semester on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 9:30 a.m. taught by Dr. Michael Ault. Management consulting is a \$250 billion industry and is growing quickly. The purpose of this course is to explore how to conduct Organizational Communication assessment and consulting methodologies. The class will cover the main positions of assessment strategies in the field of Organizational Communication. Some of the main topics included in this course represent the methods of organizational assessment, contemporary means of conducting assessments and case studies. The class can count toward the Organizational Communication emphasis or may be used as an elective in other emphasis areas. See your academic adviser to learn where this class may count.

PlayStation VP/lawyer, former WSU debater, to make two presentations

Anthony Justman, vice president and deputy general counsel for Sony Interactive Entertainment, will speak to Communication students Thursday and Friday. Justman leads a team of more than 50 lawyers and staff that deliver legal support for PlayStation businesses in North and South America. On Thursday, his presentation will be at 5:30 p.m. in Room 307 of Elizabeth Hall. On Friday, his presentation will be at 10:30 a.m. in Room 229 of Elizabeth Hall. All students are invited to attend. Some classes are offering extra credit. Justman's team advises all the key functions of PlayStation business activities in the Americas by providing strategic and operational legal advice,

negotiating contracts, and working closely with other corporate functions, such as Human Resources, Finance, Corporate Communications and Security, to protect Sony Interactive Entertainment from legal, regulatory and public relations risks. While leading, managing and building this team, Justman works closely with Sony Interactive senior leadership to enable the business and protect the company from a myriad of risks and challenges. Prior to joining Sony Interactive Entertainment, Justman received his bachelor of science degree in political science and oral communications from Weber State University and his law degree from Stanford University School of Law. He worked for a federal appeals court judge immediately after law school and then spent more than a decade in private law firm practice in the San Francisco Bay area, specializing in intellectual property and advertising law litigation and counseling. Justman joined Sony Interactive Entertainment in 2007 after a three-year stint running his own company.

Classes part of new associate's in Workplace Communication to be offered in Fall

The Communication Department will offer two courses in Fall Semester that are part of the new associate's degree in Workplace Communication & Writing. Writing for Workplace Communication (COMM 1140) is a required writing course for the new degree. It can also be substituted for Media Writing (COMM 1130) for students in the Organization Communication and Interpersonal & Family Communication emphases. Communication in Professional Settings (COMM 2550) will provide an introduction to theories and research in organizational communication and public relations. It will be offered online. The classes are part of the new interdisciplinary associate's degree offered by the departments of Communication and English. These classes may also be used to fulfill requirements for the Associate of Science in Communication degree as well as the department's bachelor's degrees.

Movie about the American journalist killed by ISIS to be shown tonight

The movie "Jim: The James Foley Story" will be shown Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. at the Weber County Main Library 2464 Jefferson Ave. The movie takes an in-depth look at the life and work of the American journalist who was killed by ISIS terrorists in 2014. A panel discussion will follow the screening with alum Jessica Miller, who won a Pulitzer Prize at the Salt Lake Tribune. She will be joined by Clare Morgana Gillis, a correspondent who worked with Foley, and Tom Durkin, program director of the James W. Foley Legacy Foundation. The movie is free.

Important information on financial aid, scholarships from college

Nearly every student in the College of Arts & Humanities receives a scholarship or another form of tuition assistance. The college offers more than 200 scholarships to students totaling nearly \$2 million in tuition. Scholarships are available by major, interest, need or even a desire to study abroad.

1. Complete the free application for federal student aid. For the first time since the start of the program, you can use your tax returns from the previous year. The FAFSA priority deadline is April 1.

3. Complete the Specialized Scholarship Application.

Tips on registering if you want to do an internship in the summer

If you are planning to do an internship in the summer but not taking any other classes, you can avoid paying for those 3 credits just for summer registration by enrolling in COMM 4890 in the Spring. That will give you access to the Canvas course. You will receive an Incomplete at the end of Spring semester, which will not affect your GPA, but you have a year to complete your online internship assignments. You can NOT do an internship in the summer, but enroll in COMM 4890 in the Fall.
